Dear Parishioners,

One picture we can grasp from this weekend's first reading and Gospel is "Care for others with our capabilities." In the first reading, we see a wife whose works completely constitutes the network of care and support that keeps the entire community alive and together: her husband, her children, her servants, her neighbours, even the poor of the neighbourhood. Her example of care for others overlaps with St. Theresa of Calcutta who often said, "Not all of us can do great things, but we can do small things with great love." Her speaking of care for others echoes through us with one clear message: There is always one capability/talent we can do to care for others with.



The Gospel this weekend shows the three servants and their master. The first two servants remembered their master's big expectations towards them as well as what they had been given by the master. Subsequently, the two men pondered how to meet with the master's expectations with the given talents. On the other hand, the last servant remembered what he had but that was all. This servant did not remember "WHY" he held that one talent.

Through this last servant, we check on whether or not we remember the ultimate reason why we have been given our talents by God. As all gifts are meant to be open and used, we are invited to use our capabilities for God, others and ourselves. Although we may think we do not have much, there is one small value that we have and can use too


MEMORIAL GARDENS

Communion from the Chalice

On the First Sunday of Advent, we will reinstate 'communion from the cup' across the Parish. The Precious Blood will be offered at all weekend and weekday Masses. During COVID the communion cup was withdrawn as a precaution and this is the first time our parish is reinstating it. Several months ago, I asked parishioners if they were ready for the cup to return and there was an overwhelming yes, however some parishioners expressed concerns, especially some Communion Ministers who would normally consume what is left after communion.

Everyone will need to make their own decision if they wish to receive from the cup, and Communion Ministers are asked to contact the Parish Office if they have concerns consuming what remains after communion. We will be offering 2 cups at each Mass, and there will only be a small amount of wine put out. My preference is that the cup runs out toward the end of



communion, so there is no Prescious Blood remaining. We are also reminded that Jesus Christ is 'whole and entire' under both the form of bread and under the form of wine. We can choose to consume the Host, or the Host and Precious Blood, however no matter the choice, we still receive the body, blood, soul, and divinity of our Lord regardless.

REFLECTION

The readings for this week, taken as a whole unit, can be seen as difficult for modern hearers (and they probably were for the original audience.) The first reading praises a good ,hard-working woman, who, by her efforts, earns honour for her husband. How would a woman, struggling with a failing marriage hear this today, and would she feel condemned by it? How would a husband, who feels that she is to blame for the problems in their marriage, hear this?

The Psalm, asking for peace for Jerusalem is hollow today, as the army of Israel, some of whom claim to be God's people, is inflicting horrors on innocent people in the name of revenge. This is hardly the way to earn God's blessing.

St Paul was warning the Thessalonians - and us - not to waste time speculating about the date of the return of Jesus. Many people or groups over the years have proclaimed that they have this knowledge, despite Scripture warning otherwise. He reminds us that we should live good lives and so be ready whenever Jesus returns.

St Matthew's Gospel seems unfair to the cautious servant who put his master's money away safely till his return, then was punished for not risking it in investments, as the other servants did. Does this mean that we shouldn't use the talents God has entrusted to us in an active way, but just hold them close to ourselves? No. It has been said that God has given us brains and He doesn't want them back in mint condition, but well-used. May He show us how/when/where and for whom He wants us to use what He has given us so that we can give a good account of this when we meet Him, either here or in Eternity. **Judith Holznagel**

WHAT IS THE FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING?

The Church celebrates the Feast of Christ the King, also called the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, on the last Sunday of the Liturgical year. The Feast was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925 with his encyclical Quas primas, to respond to a world that was rejecting Christ and was being dominated by secularism. Pope Pius hoped that the establishment of this feast would bring about the following:



- That this annual celebration would assist the faithful to gain strength in their true King, Jesus Christ.
- That leaders and nations would recognise that they are bound to submit and give respect to Christ the King.
- That nations would see that the Church has the right to freedom, and immunity from the state. In these times when we are challenged in our faith and our ability to worship together, let us remember that Jesus Christ is Our King who reigns forever.
- That individuals should honour and recognise Jesus as their 'Sovereign King' and emulate his total gift of self, perfectly embodied on the Cross. In imitation of their thorn-crowned King, individuals can help bring love and relief to those who suffer and help to proclaim the Good News of the Reign of Christ in the world today.
